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*So, What's Your Story?*

## WORSHIP NOTES FOR SEPTEMBER

*This schedule is subject to change, as need may arise.*

- SUNDAY, SEPTEMBER 1, 9:55 AM — *Twelfth Sunday after Pentecost; Sacrament of Christ's Table; Labor Day Weekend.*  
 Scriptures: Jeremiah 2:4-13; Philemon 8-16. **Message of the Day:** “*Dismantling Slaveholder Religion, Part 2: The Outcome.*” Labor activists in the 20<sup>th</sup> Century won for us the 40-hour work week, an end to child labor, collective bargaining, and other matters of worker justice we sometimes take for granted. We live in their outcomes. Still, the long shadows of slavery and forced labor continue to impact our economy and means of production. What outcomes may still be possible?
- SATURDAY, SEPTEMBER 7, 6:00 PM — *Saturday Night Light: The Jazz of Preaching*, led by Youth Minister Erick Falconer and the SNL Band in the William E. Sample Chapel. With music made by young people and a message designed for all, this is a spirited, sacred time! Specifics of this edition of SNL will be announced, closer to the date. Watch your weekly eNews and *Selected Upcoming Events* circular in your Sunday worship bulletin.
- SUNDAY, SEPTEMBER 8, 9:55 AM — *Thirteenth Sunday after Pentecost; Rally Day (Theme: “So, What’s Your Story?”).*  
 Scripture: Philemon 6-7, 17-21. This Sunday marks the start of our new program year, including the return of the choirs and a ritual commencing Confirmation Classes. Pastor Dave Denoon’s 3-part series on the letter to Philemon ends with his **Message of the Day:** “*Dismantling Slaveholder Religion, Part 3: Moral Reconstruction.*” The first Reconstruction, 1865-1877, was declared a failure soon after it ended. It was too radical, too progressive, it was argued. How can a few people in one church set successfully about the work that’s needed?
- SUNDAY, SEPTEMBER 15, 9:55 AM — *Fourteenth Sunday after Pentecost.* Scriptures: Psalm 119:105-112; Luke 8:4-10 (11-15). On Rally Day, we will have been introduced to the theme for the rest of September: “**So, What’s Your Story?**” Each week, we’ll concentrate on a parable of Jesus. This Sunday, Pastor Dave Denoon discusses the Parable of the Sower and what Jesus said was the purpose of parables generally. **Message of the Day:** “*Sowing Confusion*”
- SATURDAY, SEPTEMBER 21, 6:00 PM — *Saturday Night Light: The Jazz of Preaching.* See September 7 listing, above.
- SUNDAY, SEPTEMBER 22, 9:55 AM — *Fifteenth Sunday after Pentecost.* Scriptures: Amos 8:4-7; Luke 16:1-13. The **Oikos Ensemble** and **Logos Readers** join us for a jazzy service. We continue with the theme, “**So, What’s Your Story?**” and focus on Jesus’ parable of the Dishonest Manager, in which a conniving accountant is praised by his boss for cooking the books in his own favor! **Message of the Day:** “*What on Earth..?*”
- SUNDAY, SEPTEMBER 29, 9:55 AM — *Sixteenth Sunday after Pentecost; “Worship 2.0.”* Scriptures: Amos 8:4-7; Luke 16:1-13. “Worship 2.0” is an all-ages, interactive liturgy, with movements and moments in the service explained as we go. Message-wise, we continue with the theme, “**So, What’s Your Story?**” and focus on Jesus’ parable of Dives and Lazarus, in which an ignorant rich man attempts to send a message from the Great Below to his family, so that they may avoid his fate. **Message of the Day:** “*Change the World*”

I guess we could declare that the summer is officially over, whether we want it to be or not. Hopefully you enjoyed your summer activities and are excited for the start of another church season. There are many events already on the upcoming church calendar, some familiar and some new. Keep checking the Covenant News and the E News for the latest happenings around the church. I hope you take advantage of the many opportunities for involvement that will be available to you.

During the summer the various church committees and working groups have been busy preparing for both this year and for the church of the future. The Strategic Planning Committee (StratCom), under the excellent leadership of Jenny Jones, made an update report following the service on Sunday, August 18, to over 60 interested congregants. An update was presented on the ongoing work of StratCom in two primary areas. The first area of the update pertained to the “use of church” and the process being used to increase our financial income while maximizing the use of the facility for the benefit of our members and the community. Diane McLean reported on the process and what has been done so far. She also discussed the next steps that will help define the various options that are available. There are many exciting ideas that the committee will continue to explore concerning the “use of church.” These ideas will be evaluated as to how they best meet the mission of our church and the spaces we have available. Your input and ideas will be solicited along the way.

The second area of the report concerned the development of church Vision and Mission statements. This was written by a subcommittee of the StratCom and guided by the church survey that was distributed last spring. After much discussion with the professional staff and committee members as well as analyzing input from the survey, Bob Moody and Jeanene Harris crafted a working document that was presented to the church during this update meeting. Copies of the document are available online and in the church office. You are asked to provide additional input and comment before Rally Day on September 8. The document will be reviewed and, if necessary, revised based upon the comments and suggestions that were received. The final Vision and Mission Statements will be presented for adoption at a church meeting on October 6. There is a box located in the church office for your suggestions, or you can email them to the committee chair Jenny Jones ([jennifer.jones@rubinbrown.com](mailto:jennifer.jones@rubinbrown.com)), or to me ([marke@wustl.edu](mailto:marke@wustl.edu)).

Also working hard through the summer has been the Communications Committee, chaired by Linda Kopetti. They are tasked with how to best communicate the “Who we are” component of our church. They have been busy looking at all areas of print, video and social media as vehicles to best tell our story. One of their initiatives is to gather pictures that best describe our church in action. ## THEY'RE OUR CHILDREN, TOO

A few weeks ago, Jan told me about an upcoming trip to Oklahoma to protest the upcoming opening of a new detention center for immigrant children. I was luke-warmish to the idea and readily forgot about it.

A week or so later she told me that she had decided to go. I opened my eyes and my mind and started asking questions. It was to be a two-day trip to Lawton, OK staying overnight, having a rally at a church followed by a demonstration at Ft. Sill where the detention center was to be.

The next day she told me she had sent in her reservation. This really made me pay attention. I quickly looked at the details and decided that I could and should be part of it also. In the days before we left, the government had decided to postpone the opening of the detention center for reasons we really didn't know, but it was decided that the trip and protest would go on as planned. And so, at 7:30 am on Wednesday, July 31<sup>st</sup>, Jan and I boarded a nice, large, comfortable bus and headed west toward Oklahoma.

There were two buses, over 100 people altogether, making the journey. With several stops en route, we arrived at our hotel about 7:30pm, got a bit to eat and headed to our rooms to get some rest. The following morning we bussed to Lawton Hill Methodist Church who had graciously invited us to rally on their lawn. We sang songs of protest, strength and courage. We heard brief stories about refugees who had died while in detention and stories of the desperate situations that forced them to flee their homelands.

Several Hispanic young men were putting a new roof on a small house across the street using a generator and nail guns. Shortly, we noticed the noise had stopped. The men, standing, then sitting, on the roof, were watching and listening to the stories and chants. It was a powerful moment. Many turned and looked to them and them to us, holding our signs. Knowing that our simple act did mean something to someone made it all worthwhile.

After an hour or so, we re-boarded our buses and went to the front gate of Fort Sill where we again gathered to sing and chant our disapproval of the conditions at detention centers. Several police officers kept watch but let us continue our action. After 30 minutes or so, we headed back to our buses for the trip back to St. Louis. At 10:00pm we pulled into our starting point. It was two days of riding a bus for about 1½ hours of protesting.

Was it worth it? Some have said it was a waste.

We all decided that, if we don't say something now, when we will be speak up? We all decided it was important to show that we are watching. We all decided to interrupt our lives for two days to take part in this. We all decided that it was absolutely worth the time and effort to give our voices to those who voices have been silenced.

This trip was organized by Heartland for Human Justice, a newly organized coalition of non-profit groups based in St. Louis. Founding coalition members were Central Reform Congregation, Congregation Sha'are Emeth, Jewish Community Relations Council of St. Louis, National Council of Jewish Women – St. Louis, St. Louis Japanese American Citizen League, United Hebrew Congregation, Women's Voices Raised for Social Justice. Other members included Parkway UCC and several other faith-based and secular groups. Please join us for a presentation by Mark Cereghino, CLU, ChFC, and Jennifer Jones, CPA, CGMA, for a discussion of how to make your charitable gifts tax wise. With the increase in the standard deduction under the new 2018 tax law, some church members might think they are losing a deduction for their pledge, but there are a number of approved ways to get that deduction back for many of us.

Mark has been a Financial Planner with New York Life for 34 years. Jenny is a CPA and currently is part of the executive team at RubinBrown LLP, a certified public accounting and professional consulting firm. Together, they will give you some simple and easy-to-understand ideas that could improve your tax bill as you continue to make your pledge. Four specific tax-wise strategies for you to consider for your Annual Pledge will be explained.

Mark, who has been the volunteer chair of Legacy Giving for Channel 9 for 11 years, will also share some simple ideas on how to include the church in your estate plan. At least five tax-wise legacy planning strategies will be addressed. Most importantly, the discussion will be clear and understandable.

Throughout the presentation, we will address any questions that you might have on these important topics.

The focus at the Daniel Boone Historic Home in Defiance is on the Boone's years in Missouri. But Daniel Boone's historic importance was established well before he moved to St. Charles County. As a preview of the SAGE tour of the Boone site at Defiance, Joan Musbach will present a program, "Daniel Boone Before Defiance" for anyone interested in the life of this important early American frontiersman. Although unlike Davy Crockett, there is no folklore that "he kilt him a b'ar when he was only three," it is documented that Boone killed ninety-nine bears in one hunting season! Bear bacon was a major source of food for people on the frontier. Come learn other interesting stories of his life west of the Appalachians.

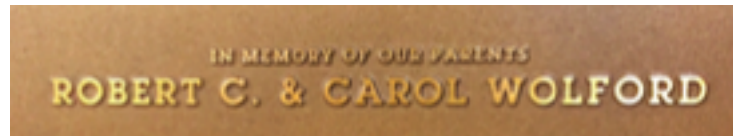

## HISTORY... DID YOU KNOW?

The Parlor has changed locations and been redecorated several times. Today it is located on the second floor in what was originally the 1870 church structure. After the 1892-3 sanctuary was built, this original church space was refitted as a gymnasium, a sort of community center. It accommodated nicely, each week, 40 to 60 men who came to play volleyball, youth who played basketball and scouts who did their drills. When the area was no longer used as a gym a ceiling and upper room were added in 1929, in conjunction with the building of the Sunday school wing. It came to be known as Bradley's Chapel, later the Youth Room, and at present it is called the Upper Room. The lower level of what had been the gym was turned into a parlor. One of the redecorations, done in 1960, was dedicated to Carrie Prehn a long time member of the church and the Women's Association. She worked in her quiet way at many tasks for many years (put mite boxes on tables at Women's Association luncheons and collected them afterwards for years.) The latest refurbishing happened in 1992-3, in memory of parents by Robert and Carol Wolford. Both Wolfords were very involved in church activities until they moved out of state. In the parlor now is a portrait on the west wall of Paul Davis, our minister from 1965 to 1993. A grouping of pictures on the south wall includes a black and white photo of the sanctuary as it looked after a 1971 remodeling.



The Knight family decided a **Bride's Room** would be just the right memorial for Mariel Knight, mother of present member Marge Gable. Muriel had long wished there was a special room at the church in which brides could make last minute preparations before they walked down the aisle. In a space on the second floor, that had previously been an office, such a room was created in the early 1970s. On February 25, 1973, church members were invited to view the new room after worship. During

the Restoration 2000 Project the room was updated by Hal & Nancy Knight and Ken & Marge Gable.
