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## FROM THE PASTOR

### "Twelve Steps"

Do to others as you would have them do to you. (Luke 6:31)

When I was on the staff of a large church, my boss – the director of the Pastoral Care department – was inspired one day to begin a new group that would help people to focus on their obligations to others. This was to be a twelve-step program, like Alcoholics Anonymous. She decided to call her group, *Sinners Anonymous*. This associate pastor's dream was to be able to sit people down, once a week, and to talk together about one of twelve steps she had devised for the sake of becoming more conscientiously Christian.

Given the name, there was cautious interest in the group, to begin. I don't know whether it ever caught on. I was called to pastor my first UCC congregation before its first meeting took place.

I was reminded of Sinners Anonymous recently, when Sister Carla Mae Streeter talked with me about her participation in the organization, Compassionate St. Louis. Her group is trying to get faith communities and other institutions across the area to adopt religious historian Karen Armstrong's Charter for Compassion. This is a document composed by Armstrong and faith leaders from across the world. Armstrong has even written a book to go along with the Charter, entitled, *Twelve Steps to a Compassionate Life*. (Are you getting where I'm going with this?)

The most common principle to all religions, Armstrong notes, is the Golden Rule. Recognizing this, Armstrong proposes forming groups within organizations, but especially faith communities, to help individuals live a growingly compassionate life. Failing to be mindful of our obligation to compassion will prevent compassion from flowing. Having a group of people who can struggle with us toward greater mindfulness should empower our commitment to compassion's practice.

Now, you might say that this is what the church is for – and it is – to make us better and better at the things Jesus calls and commands us to do. But can we hope to achieve this goal without having a group to counsel with us about it?

Would you be interested in being part of such a group? Or is discussion about compassion, maybe, already an important component of a group you are in? I'd be very interested to hear from some of you about this.

And I promise not to name any such group, Sinners Anonymous.

## WORSHIP NOTES FOR MARCH

The services of worship that we offer during the season of Lent will all be rooted in our Bible study of the final week of Jesus' earthly life. (Amy-Jill Levine's *Entering the Passion of Jesus: A Beginner's Guide to Holy Week*)

*This schedule is subject to change, as need may arise.*

SUNDAY, MARCH 1, 9:55 AM – *First Sunday in Lent; Sacrament of Christ's Table; UCC Women's Wee.* Scriptures: Zechariah 9:9-11; Matthew 21:1-11. Pastor Dave Denoon examines the first day of Jesus' final week, a Sunday and a working day which included Jesus' ironically appearing "triumphal" entry into Jerusalem.. ***Message of the Day:*** "War Horse vs. Donkey"

SUNDAY, MARCH 8, 9:55 AM — *Second Sunday in Lent; International Women's Day; Daylight Saving Time begins.* Scriptures: Isaiah 56:6-8; Mark 11:15-19. For ages Christians have told the story of "the cleansing of the Temple" as if it is about righteous anger, specifically about Jesus' outrage over corruption. Prof. Levine suggests that his outrage was instead aimed at people's hypocrisy. ***Message of the Day:*** "Temple vs. Temple"

SUNDAY, MARCH 15, 9:55 AM — *Third Sunday in Lent; Amistad Sunday.* Scriptures: Mark 12:41-44. Challengers ask Jesus about paying taxes. A scribe asks Jesus if he knows the greatest commandment. Then, a widow places two almost worthless coins in the Temple treasury. This entire day at the Temple has provided Jesus an opportunity to talk about the importance of exercising proper values. ***Message of the Day:*** "Money vs. Values"

SUNDAY, MARCH 22, 9:55 AM — *Fourth Sunday in Lent; "One Great Hour of Sharing" special offering.* Scripture: Matthew 26:6-13. The Oikos Jazz Ensemble joins us for an exploration of the meaning of Jesus' anointing by an unnamed woman at Bethany. This story unfolds in a different way in each of the Gospels, and in each case it may be referring to Jesus as "the Anointed One." But in each case, someone objects, perceiving that pleasure may be the woman's intention. Also, however, in each case Jesus says it means something else. We riff together on the themes to be found here. ***Message of the Day:*** "Pleasure vs. Authority vs. Death"

SUNDAY, MARCH 29, 9:55 AM — *Fifth Sunday in Lent; All Ages Worship.* Scriptures: Exodus 12:21-28; John 13:5-9; Mark 14:66-72. Student Minister Merrimon Boyd offers a reflection on the Last Supper.

Don't miss PALM SUNDAY, APRIL 5, 9:55 AM, when KC the Wonder Donkey returns for a re-enactment of the triumphal procession we will have studied on March 1. We will celebrate communion, and Pastor Dave Denoon will offer the final sermon in our series based on *Entering the Passion of Jesus* with a message based on the incidents at Gethsemane when Jesus was betrayed, especially Mark 13:32-52. These moments tested Jesus' sense of purpose... and challenge us about our own. ***Message of the Day:*** "Violence vs. Nonviolence"







## HOLIDAY LIBRARY ✓ IT OUT


*In March you will find several books on the Library book cart that will help readers answer questions that many children ask at one time or another.*




*What's Happening to Grandpa?* is a loving story about Kate and her Grandpa who has Alzheimer's disease.

## PAUSE FOR (NO) THOUGHT WITH FCCWG'S NEW CAMPUS MINISTER AT WEBSTER UNIVERSITY

Would you like to learn to meditate? Are you curious about the difference increased mindfulness could make in your (spiritual) life? The Rev. Dr. Laurel Hayes, a new member of the church, has been the campus minister of Stillpoint Multi-Faith Campus Ministry at Webster University since its inception in 2002. The one program she has offered consistently has been Pause for (No) Thought: Meditation for Everyone, a weekly drop-in meditation session. In order to deepen her own meditation practice and to become a more effective teacher, she is in a two-year Mindfulness Meditation Teacher Certification Program (MMTCP), whose lead teachers are Jack Kornfield and Tara Brach.

For her MMTCP practicum, Laurel is offering a free five-week beginning course in mindfulness, compassion, and loving kindness practices, followed by a one-day intensive, both here at church. The course will take place on April 14, 21, and 28 and May 5 and 12 (Tuesdays) from 7:00 to 8:30 P.M. The daylong intensive will take place on Saturday, May 16, from 9 A.M. to 4 P.M. You are welcome to meditate in a chair, so you do not need to be flexible. Please email Laurel at [laurel.hayes@sbcglobal.net](mailto:laurel.hayes@sbcglobal.net) if you would like to participate in either the five-week course and/or the daylong event. (If you do not have email, you may leave your name with the church office.) Each class session will build on the last, so please plan to attend all five if you register for the course. The intensive will build on the course, although you do not need to attend the intensive to take part in the course. If you have some experience in mindfulness meditation already, you are welcome to sign up for the intensive without taking the course.

Dear Scouting Family,

On February 18, 2020, the national organization of the Boy Scouts of America (BSA) filed for Chapter 11 bankruptcy to achieve two key objectives: equitably compensate victims who were harmed during their time in Scouting and continue to carry out Scouting's mission for years to come.

While the word "bankruptcy" can be intimidating, **it is important to know that Scouting programs will continue.** Your regular unit meetings and activities, district and council events, other Scouting adventures and countless service projects will take place as usual.

We took this action today amid increasing financial pressure on the BSA from litigation involving past abuse in Scouting. We are outraged that there have been times when individuals took advantage of our programs to abuse innocent children and sincerely apologize to anyone who was harmed during their time in Scouting. We believe victims, we support them, we provide counseling by a provider of their choice, and we encourage them to come forward. Our plan is to use this Chapter 11 process to create a Trust that would provide equitable compensation to these individuals.

As we go through this process, we want to make certain that all Scouting parents and volunteers know the following:

- **Scouting is safer now than ever before.** Approximately 90% of the pending and asserted claims against the BSA relate to abuse that occurred more than 30 years ago. As someone close to Scouting, you know the safety of children in our programs is the BSA's absolute top priority and that one instance of abuse is one too many. That's precisely why over many years we've developed some of the strongest expert-informed youth protection policies found in any youth-serving organization.

From mandatory youth protection training and background checks for all volunteers and staff, to policies that prohibit one-on-one interaction between youth and adults and require that any suspected abuse is reported to law enforcement, our volunteers and employees take youth protection extremely seriously and do their part to help keep kids safe. You can read more about the BSA's multi-layered safeguards and our efforts to be part of the broader solution to child abuse at [www.scouting.org/youth-safety](http://www.scouting.org/youth-safety). In fact, this is a resource that you can share with friends and family who are interested in understanding what the BSA is doing to keep kids safe.

- **Scouting continues.** Scouting programs will continue to serve youth, families and local communities throughout this process and for many years to come. Just last year, communities across the country benefited from more than 13 million Scouting service hours, and young men and women earned more than 1.7 million merit badges that represent skills that will help them succeed throughout their lives. Studies prove and parents agree that Scouting helps young people become more kind, helpful and prepared for life, and as long as those values remain important to our society, Scouting will continue to be invaluable to our nation's youth.
- **Local councils have not filed for bankruptcy.** Local councils – which provide programming, financial, facility and administrative support to Scouting units in their communities – are legally separate, distinct and financially independent from the national organization.
