FROM THE PASTOR

A Watery Year

In the year that Noah turned 601, in the first month, on the first day of the month, the waters were dried up from the earth... In the second month, on the twenty-seventh day of the month, the earth was dry... Yhwh said, "I will never again curse the earth because of humankind." (Genesis 9:13, 14, 21)

The world as we're living it leaves us in a quandary.

I know, I'm not telling you anything about which you were not aware. The novel coronavirus, the political maelstrom in which we find ourselves, this moment in history which bears a powerful resemblance to so many other moments in world and American history, all these and more have set us all adrift without a reliable wind or rudder.

We are isolated, uncertain, and in what feels like constant peril. Life's most persistent quality, of course, has always been its unpredictability. If there is one thing that we have unfailingly sought to do, it is to add some semblance of reliability to our day-to-day living, to our income, to our holdings and investments (both economic and spiritual). But, no matter how affluent we may be, there is nothing about this season of our world's life offering us security.

As we search for a new person to lead our educational ministries, it occurs to me that our Sunday School and other programs for children and youth are designed to develop in them the spiritual skills they will need in order to survive times like these. Other generations have faced economic crises, wars, and famines. My own generation were children during the Cold War; we came of age imagining that new or developing societal structures would assure the rights of all people to self-determination and dignity. Furthermore, we were told that life's evolution is one that leads to greater and greater order, surer and surer freedom. There is little I do in my adulthood that isn't colored by these presumptions of liberty and justice. So, nowadays when it becomes clear that we haven't made as much progress as my child-self was told we would, the disorder of this time is disorienting.

I'm reminded of Noah and his family on the flooded earth for a year (Genesis 8-9), of Jonah singing in the belly of a great fish. I remember stories of Jesus, wakened from sleeping during a high gale and stilling the storm (Matthew 8:23-27; Mark 4:35-41; Luke 8:22-25); walking upon the water to join his disciples in a boat (Matthew 14:22-27; Mark 6:45-50; John 6:16-21); and a crowd of people commandeering unsuspecting fishing vessels in order to catch up to him (John 6:22-24). Our baptisms hail all those images of perseverance and faith, and God's reassurance that we need not fear..

"You cannot enter God's realm unless you are born of water and the Spirit," Jesus told Nicodemus (John 3:5). And so we are.

MODERATOR'S CORNER SEPTEMBER 2020

As schools start and we slide into the Fall season we find ourselves still dealing with the uncertainty of a pandemic and ongoing need to be a strong church for both the congregation and the community. Although there is still no timeline for the establishment of a new normal, many people at First Congregational Church have been hard at work to meet the challenges that we are confronting. The Three Ministries reconvened in August and held their first meeting since the start of the pandemic, five months ago. Church work has continued during this time and all of the meetings have been conducted by Zoom.

The Restart Committee has been monitoring the COVID-19 numbers in St. Louis County and St. Louis City in order to make informed decisions on how to proceed with church activities. Because of a spike in the numbers the past few weeks, the County has tightened their requirements and restrictions. As you are probably aware, the church, with a few exceptions, has not reopened for services or activities. The committee has worked to develop a safe protocol to allow for the recording of online services and to the use of Memorial Hall for the November elections. Requests for use by individuals or groups presenting a tight COVID-19 protocol will still be considered.

On August 23 the church services made a smooth transition from a Zoom presentation to a pre-recorded production available on YouTube and Facebook. This production allows the entire service to be produced in the sanctuary from beginning to end. This method demands much less time for production and has the familiarity of a normal church service in the sanctuary. A great thanks goes out to all those involved with the making such a meaningful production. Viewing is available any time after 3:00 pm on Saturday afternoon. Fellowship will still be conducted as a Zoom meeting at 11:00. In addition, a 3:00 pm Wednesday afternoon Prayer gathering is being offered by Pastor Denoon and Student Minister Elston McCowan via Zoom. Another major initiative currently being undertaken by the Three Ministries and the Executive Ministry is the development of a new job description for a Pastoral Assistant to revitalize and lead Christian Education for children and youth as well as assist in pastoral care and worship services. This will be a full time position designed to meet the changing needs of our church. A detailed plan was developed last year that called for the creation of several part time positions to meet the needs of Christian Education. Job descriptions were created and advertised, and then the pandemic hit. There was no interest in the jobs as stated and the nature of our needs changed. This new initiative is designed to attract a creative applicant who can bring a variety of attributes to First Church. This process has just started but is going to move quickly.

Meanwhile, please stay healthy and active. Do your best to stay connected to your church community and reach out to each other for support. There is much that can be done, so please agree to help when asked and continue with your financial support. Although each day brings new challenges and directions, I am confident that we can turn them into opportunities to be a stronger church.

The charts on the previous page are the church operating results for the six months ending June 30.

Items to note regarding operating income:

1. Pledges and Gifts income is lower than prior year to date
2. With the church building being closed, the use of church income is down approximately \$18,000 compared to last year

Items to note regarding the balance sheet:

1. Cash and short term investments on hand were:
 - a. June 2020 - \$216,102
 - b. June 2019 - \$189,582
2. Included in cash and short term investments are the funds from a loan provided by the Paycheck Protection Program of the CARES Act. The \$62,300 loan has a two year term with 1% interest, with no penalty for early prepayment. The Paycheck Protection Program (PPP loan) was created to provide loans to help organizations keep their workforce employed during the Coronavirus (COVID-19) crisis. The PPP loan has the potential for a portion of the loan to be forgiven if the funds were used for payroll, benefits, rent and utilities. We are currently gathering information for the forgiveness application.

DID YOU KNOW... FRED KAUL, MODERATOR 2006 - 2009

At a Special Congregational Meeting on September 14, 2008 Moderator Fred Kaul called the meeting to order. A motion was made that the Congregational Church of Webster Groves become an Open an Affirming Church. Much earlier this issue had been addressed during Paul Wentzien's years as Moderator 1994-97. Rev. Devenish had sought direction from church members on performing same-sex unions. This resulted in the church adopting the same policy for these unions as for marriages. To move further into this issue it took several years and three Moderators. During the Moderator years of Jane Porchey, Earl Rinne, and Nancy Rudolph issues relating to gays, lesbians and our church were addressed from the pulpit and in adult education sessions many times. Then in November 2007 the Executive Ministry passed a motion to start the process that led to a vote for our church to become an ONA church. Several draft statements were circulated. Comments were collected. Discussions were held. A survey was taken asking members if they were ready for a vote. Consensus was to move forward. So Moderator Fred Kaul called a Special Congregational Meeting and members



voted to become an ONA church. The first same-sex wedding ceremony in our sanctuary happened in June 2015 when Darryl White and Michael Lenard were united in holy matrimony.

A NOTE FROM YOUR RESTART COMMITTEE

We have heard from a number of you that you are eager to be back in the Sanctuary. We share your wishes. With the holiday season approaching, we look forward to reopening as soon as possible after Pastor Dave’s return from medical leave (target: October 25).

We are employing the best available science regarding the coronavirus pandemic to reopen as soon as we can in a manner that minimizes the risk of this dangerous virus to our congregants and other people who use our church. However, we know that doesn’t really help the feeling of wanting to be in that worshipful space with those you long to congregate with.

We are following the trends of the virus, St. Louis County regulations, the Webster Groves School District guidelines, and a set of science-based reopening criteria. We plan to begin the process of reopening when the rate of new infections and local restrictions permit. Notably, we are likely to reopen in phases, starting with the safest activities and proceeding sequentially through ones with greater risks.

In the meantime, we are constructing well-considered procedures for maximizing safety when we do reopen, restructuring First Friend Teams to supervise these procedures, and determining some of the ongoing needs as we transition toward a reopened church. We’ll keep you posted.
