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## FROM THE PASTOR

### A Summer of Conversations

Now [on the day of resurrection] two of them were going to a village called Emmaus, about seven miles from Jerusalem. They were talking with each other about everything that had happened. As they talked and discussed these things with each other, Jesus himself came up and walked along with them. (Luke 24:13-15)

When we speak the Covenant of our church each Sunday, we pledge "to experience the joy and struggle of discipleship." Because we speak these words as part of a covenant, we imply that we will have many of these experiences *together*. The last fourteen months have severely limited our "together" experiences. To rejuvenate our sense of community we are initiating **A Summer of Conversations** at First Church. This initiative will encourage conversations among our members that help people get to know one another, talk about why First Congregational is important to them, and get a sense of our "being called of God."

During this **Summer of Conversations** a group of leaders will invite members to have 30-minute, one-on-one conversations with them over coffee, tea, on Sunday morning, either in person, by telephone, or using a virtual medium (Zoom, Facetime, Skype, etc.). The intent is simple – have a conversation, listen to one another about what is important to each of you, talk about where you find joy or sense your passion for life and ministry, and dare to dream a little about what you wish you or your church could accomplish.

This **Summer of Conversations** is an initiative that can be a transformative experience for First Church. Imagine 200 or more conversations that would not have happened without this project. I encourage you to take a risk. If you receive an invitation to have a 30-minute conversation with a leader of our church, accept it as an opportunity to get to better know someone in this faith community.

There is no agenda behind this conversation, it is meant to be a time to listen and share. Allow yourself to get to know someone new at First Church (or if not new, then more deeply), and perhaps you can continue the practice of intentionally getting to know others. Developing the art of one-on-one conversation at First Church could be one of the most radical things we will do as a community. Who knows where listening to one another and the movement of God's Spirit might lead?

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## **WORSHIP NOTES FOR JUNE**

This schedule is subject to change, as need may arise.

**Sunday worship each week** will be shared in person for those who wish to attend and live streamed on YouTube, starting at 9:55am (bit.ly/FCCWG-YT).

In-person worshipers will be masking and social distancing while in the hallways and sanctuary.

- **A Time for Fellowship** will be provided in Memorial Hall and the Jubilee Garden, each Sunday after worship for those in person. Masking and distancing are optional in Memorial Hall and outdoors. Our Virtual Coffee Fellowship is no longer available.
- **Sunday, June 6, 10:00am** Second Sunday after Pentecost; Sacrament of Christ's Table. 2 Corinthians 4:13-5:1; Psalm 138. In a passage that is almost poetic with its prose, Paul conveys his understanding of what it means to have God in charge of our outcomes. When I read these words, I contemplate loved ones who have died and God's "house not made with hands, eternal in the heavens" (5:1). Message of the Day: "Good Grief."
- Sunday, June 13, 10:00am Third Sunday after Pentecost; Jazz Worship. The Rev. Janice Edwards
  Barnes offers our Message of the Day in a worship service centered on the imagery that will be
  featured in Sunday afternoon's final installment of our Journey through Creation series, "Earth
  Walk" (see article elsewhere in this issue, about "Earth Walk," at 3:00 pm).
- Sunday, June 20, 10:00am Fourth Sunday after Pentecost; Summer Solstice; Fathers Day. Psalm 9:9-20; 2 Corinthians 6:1-13. Many of us have traveled to places where it seems that there is no middle class, but that you are either among the very few rich or the very many poor. This was how all the world was in the First Century, when Paul was writing a study in contrasts. The Church he helped found, in every place he went, would bring together people from all walks of life into communities that must have been profoundly confusing to the people around them. In my message on this day, "Open Wide," I will reflect with you on how Paul did this and how we can continue in the same way.
- Sunday, June 27, 10:00am Fifth Sunday after Pentecost; Pride Weekend. Corinthians 8:7-15. You know those fund drives when the "ask" tugs at your heart strings, especially with tugs of guilt? Charities, public media, arts organizations, maybe even churches, will often appeal to our feelings of inadequacy or competition in order to optimize their incomes. The Epistle reading this week finds Paul doing that, too. My sermon for this Sunday has the title, "Unpacking Affluence." We'll ponder together different meanings of that phrase what it means to be affluent, how this sort of "ask" influences us to give, why the first leaders of the Church divested themselves of their affluence, and whether affluence is appropriate for faithful people.

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## **OFFICE HOURS AND PROTOCOLS**

Now that pandemic restrictions are easing, the professional and operations staff of the Church are keeping regular hours again.

- **Building Manager Chip Isringhaus** is at the church, from 7:00AM until 2:00PM, Monday through Friday.
- **Custodian Darrell Lakies** is on-site, from 1:00 until 9:00PM, Monday through Thursday, and from 7:00AM until 2:00PM, Sunday.
- **Pastor Dave Denoon** is in the office, 9:00AM to 3:00PM, Monday through Thursday, and available on Sunday from 8:30AM until 12:30PM. He is available by appointment inside and outside these hours, Sunday through Thursday.
- **Pastoral Assistant Halley Kim** is in the office, 9:00AM to 5:00PM, Tuesday through Friday, and on Sundays, 9:00AM until noon.
- **Director of Music and Organist Dr. Leon Burke, III**, is in the office, from 1:00PM to 3:00PM on Monday and Tuesday; 1:00PM to 9:00PM on Thursday; other times, he is available by appointment.

It is always advisable to call ahead, although drop-in visits are welcome. All of these staff members are fully vaccinated, but it is requested that all office visitors arrive in masks. Once you are meeting in your office-destination, you and the staff member may decide whether to remain with masks and distance between you. Thank you for your cooperation.

## **UPCOMING MEMORIALS**

Restrictions during the COVID pandemic prevented a number of celebrations from taking place at the church. Two weddings that had been schedule for the latter part of 2020 were relocated, and memorial services for some of our beloved members were delayed. Some of these memorials have since been scheduled, and this article serves as notice to the Congregation of those events.

All these services will follow the same health protocols as for Sunday mornings – masks and social distance required in the sanctuary and hallways; masks and distance optional in Memorial Hall.

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## **CONFIRMATION BEGINS, TUESDAY, JUNE 8**

A group of nine students will assemble on Tuesday, June 8, with leaders Pastor Dave Denoon and Pastoral Assistant Halley Kim at 6:30PM in the William Sample Chapel, to begin their regular, twice-monthly meetings. Using the curriculum, Confirm Not Conform, students will become acquainted with Christianity, our church, and our denomination.

The Confirmation Class will have all the parts you have come to expect – adult mentors (please see the following article), experiences at houses of worship of other religions, a lock-in at the church, and service opportunities. The class will be in recess during the months of July and December, but the remaining ten months will accommodate the twenty sessions planned and our celebration of their work – the "iConfirm" worship service on June 5, 2022.

### FROM THE PASTORAL ASSISTANT TO OUR YOUTH

I can confirm: it's Confirmation time! (Sorry, I couldn't resist). I am really excited about entering into this process with you all. Just as Confirmation is new to you, it's also new to me. I do not come from a background that practiced Confirmation so we will be learning together.

I could tell from the title of this program that I was going to like it: Confirm, Not Conform. Something you'll find out about me quickly is that I hate conformity. If someone wants to make me go left, I'll go right. If I'm supposed to stand up in worship, it's entirely possible I'll remain seated just to be contrary. For better or worse, I want to do things my own way.

Plenty of times this headstrong individuality of mine is pure stubbornness and not one of my best qualities, but if there's anything worth being stubbornly true to yourself about, it's faith.

I invite you to approach Confirmation with utter honesty. I've been all over the place with faith, from none at all, to conservative doctrine, to intense confusion and throwing it all away, to a progressive and agnostic theology (basically, a focus on justice with a strong dash of doubt). I hope that I can be an ironically helpful guide to you by NOT actually knowing where your road-map leads or what your answers are. Pastor Dave and I will instead hold non-judgmental space for you to discern your own faith journey. The offer is for you to confirm your own values and beliefs, not to conform to ours.

Madeleine L'Engle wrote, "Those who believe they believe in God, but without passion in the heart, without anguish of mind, without uncertainty, without doubt, and even at times without despair, believe only in the idea of God, and not in God Himself" (or Herself! Or Themselves!).

You can truly bring your whole self to Confirmation (and to God, for that matter). I'm sure there will be Tuesdays that we gather that I don't think anyone's listening to our prayers. There will be others that I'll get annoyed with some Bible verse we're talking about and want to gripe about it. I'll be honest about my faith and doubts too, and I hope you'll feel encouraged to do the same.

Bring your questions, frustrations, doubts, and heresies – they are holy. See you June 8th.

The thrill of joining voice in our covenant, in prayer, readings and singing the Doxology was even more than I expected. It is good to "be in community" with all of you.

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# OUR CHURCH DURING CHALLENGING TIMES POLIO EPIDEMIC, continued

When Dodie Kishlar and her unborn child died of polio in 1952 church members decided to dedicate the Sleeper Creeper Room to her. She had been interested in supporting this type of room for our church. Gifts, in her memory, were used to add equipment to the room. The old Webster Room, located where the office is now, was renamed the Kishlar Room. Caroline Kishlar decided to redecorate this room as a memorial to her son, Lamar, Jr. after his death in 1969. Dodie and Lamar's son, James, raised by his grandparents, became an artist/architect. Several of his paintings hung in the Kishlar Room until 1992-1923 when our present office and sanctuary were built in that space and a second floor room acquired the name, Kishlar Room and was redecorated again.



The senior Kishlar worked for Ralston Purina in the research and development area. When his son was in the iron lung, quoting from a 1960 St. Louis Dispatch article, "One night Lamar's iron lung broke down. There was no one in St, Louis we could call to make the necessary repairs. It was a frantic time for me. My son's life was hanging in the balance. I decided right there I would learn how to be a respirator technician." With his research and technical skills he was soon getting calls from hospitals and patients. He was rather busy as iron lungs were constantly breaking down. For his own son he invented and built an unusual breathing device that Lamar Jr. used when he was out of his iron lung. There were other inventions he made. Among them was an electric frame in which he suspended an electric typewriter on which his son could type with a mouth stick, and a stethoscope he used to listen to the bearings of a respirator to keep it properly lubricated.



To keep everyone employed during the pandemic, the church applied for loans through the Paycheck Protection Program (PPP) of the CARES Act. In total, the church has received \$124,600 from the CARES Act programs. Our first loan was forgiven in December 2020 and we will work with Enterprise Bank to apply for forgiveness of the second loan also. Without this help, our cash balance would only be approximately \$80k which is less than two months of cash operating needs for the church. Thankfully, our pledge income continues to be strong.
