on Sunday, November 7
Turn your clocks back be-

Furn your clocks *back* before you go to sleep on Saturday the 6th "The Revolution Will Be Televised"

By the rivers of Babylon where we sat down

And there we wept when we remembered Zion.

'Cause the wicked carried us away in captivity, required from us a song.

How can we sing King Alpha's song in a strange land?

So let the words of our mouth and the meditation of our heart

Be acceptable in Thy sight, O Fari!

("By the Rivers of Babylon," The Melodians, 1970; adapted from Psalms 137 and 19)

Over the years as the pastor here, I have heard observations about the vibrancy our church once enjoyed. And wherever I speak with other pastors, I hear through them their congregations' concerns that things for them are not as bounteous as they once were. In fact, in every church I have ever served members have lamented over how sadly different things in the present are from the ways and numbers they so fondly remember. Can we return? they wonder. If not, how can we rejoice?

The scriptures cited above in the wonderful song by the Melodians were written during an interim time when the lands of the Jewish people had been seized by the Assyrians and Babylonians and many of the people relocated to the capitals of those empires. The Temple on Mount Zion had been leveled, and Jews found themselves feeling devastated: How can we sing the songs of Zion in a strange land? Though I am loath to compare our laments to theirs, I cannot deny mainline Christians' feelings, and these are feelings of loss... even feelings of defeat.

At my suggestion recently, Pastoral Assistant Halley Kim and recent Eden seminary graduate Merrimon Boyd organized a series of consultative sessions with active church members. Each is a part of one of the underrepresented generations among our worshipers and leadership – specifically, Generations X, Y (Millennials), and Z. Participants range in age from 17 to 60 years. We've been asking, "What does First Church get right?" We've also been asking, "Where are we needing improvement?" or "What new initiatives could we be undertaking that might draw more people our age?"

You can imagine among a group as creative as we are at First Church that no one answers the first question without having something in mind about the latter two. Broadly speaking, everyone is in agreement that we have a Congregation well worth our support. Equally as broadly speaking, it was observed that we are missing the mark with regard to communication among ourselves, so our ability to support is impinged. Going further, they have said that our worship is rather dated and uninteresting to many of them, and for a church that depends on drawing in newcomers — especially those of younger generations — staying the same worship-wise really shouldn't be an option. Perhaps there are new ways of gathering we need to consider. Of course, everything needs to be live streamed and available for download, to view and participate in at times other than at 10 o'clock on a Sunday morning.

These are just a few of their observations and suggestions, and the other program staff and I are committed to adapting to the group's lead. There's still more to come, as they continue to meet, imagine, and reimagine. It may feel like a revolution, as if we are "sing[ing] King Alpha's song in a strange land." But we'll work with you to find what feels most consistent with who we say we are Daylight Savings Time Ends and to approach something like the blessings we once knew.

#### **WORSHIP NOTES FOR NOVEMBER 2021**

This schedule is subject to change, as need may arise.

Sunday worship each week will be shared in person for those who wish to attend and streamed live on YouTube, starting at 9:55am (bit.ly/FCCWG-YT).

At the time of publication, masking is required in the Sanctuary and in the halls of the church.

- **Sunday, November** 7 Sacrament of Christ's Table; Remembrance Sunday. We honor the memories and spiritual legacies of members who have died in the last twelve months, as well as our own departed loved ones, with the lighting of candles and the sharing of communion. Message of the Day: "Remembrance." Scriptures: Wisdom of Solomon 3:1-9 (apocrypha); Revelation 21:1-6a.
- **Sunday, November 14** Stewardship Sunday; Pledge In-Gathering for 2022; Sunday after Veterans Day. Complementing recognition of those who have served their country through the military will be prayers for peace is our Ritual of Commitment, this day. Pastor **Dave Denoon** turns to Psalm 1 and Matthew 25:14-30 for his message of the day: "Christ's Commentary on Profit."
- **Sunday, November 21** Reign of Christ Sunday; Thanksgiving Sunday. Turning to John 18:33-37, Pastor Dave Denoon invites us to consider the meaning of Christ reigning over us. You would think, in a democratic denomination like the UCC, we'd call Jesus our President or Prime Minister rather than our Regent! Delving into the story of the Nazarene Rabbi, the pastor asks, "What Is the Good News?"
- **Thursday, November 25** Thanksgiving Day. Although there will be no services conducted today, and no community meal in keeping with COVID restrictions, a brief devotional video will be available at our YouTube page http://bit.ly/FCCWG-YT
- Sunday, November 28 First Sunday of Advent. This Advent, church members will talk about their Christmas "treasures," as we light the candles of the Advent Wreath. The Jesse Tree reappears, and we retell the familiar prophecies of the coming of God's Anointed. And on this first Sunday of Advent, Pastor Dave Denoon reflects on the relationship challenges we all face every day, but especially during the holidays, with a message ("Practicing Tolerance") that bounces out from Romans 12:9-18 and John 13:31-35.

#### **ROBES UNWORN**

Pertaining to the Pastor's cover article, some may have noticed that he has continued his "summer casual" attire to continue into the autumn. This was no accident; his robes are not at the dry cleaners. One strong suggestion of the new Visioning Group was that worship gain a less formal feel. This has been his contribution to that effort, at least with regard to vestments.

He'll continue to wear seasonal stoles and is open to suggestions for how his attire might continue to foster an atmosphere of worship. For example, all his clergy shirts are short-sleeved. Should he expand this wardrobe, or is there another casual direction he might be following?

For our special services and other occasions, chances are that his robes will reappear. But for now, he's most Sundays, he'll be a little more comfortable.

#### MODERATOR'S CORNER - GOD'S LOVE; ROOTED AND NOURISHED

When I was young there were homework assignments for Sunday School. These always included a "memory verse" to be learned "by heart" for the next Sunday. Many of you likely have a similar experience.

The earliest such memory verse I recall was "God is Love" from First John, 4:16. As a young person I suspected that this was assigned early in what we now call "faith formation" because it was so short. As I grew in my understanding of the place of religion in my life, I came to understand that this was also first because it is foundational. Our God is a God of love, not of wrath; our task is to spread that good news to the world so that it will be a better place; ours is a religion "Rooted in Love."

Yes, you have seen this in a recent mailing to you from our church. It is the theme of this year's Stewardship campaign: **Rooted in Love**. Our faith is rooted in love; our Christian community is rooted in love; the greatest commandment is to love one another.

In pledging to support our church, we are aware that the church is not just a building, but it is in the building that we find the locus of our Christian community were we come together to share our love for each other and to have the roots of our love nourished. The building must be maintained.

We can have and exhibit love for others without being led by the clergy, but plants often develop better roots when tended to by a gardener, so our Christian love benefits from the direction provided by our faith leader and our church programming requires staff, all of whom need to be paid.

Our faith is rooted in love and those roots are nourished by your pledges to our church. We are all "called of God" to do our part in providing the necessary sustenance for our church so that the love of God can flourish. Throughout the year individuals and groups of our church support the work of spreading God's love in many ways. But this is the time of year when we pledge the financial support necessary to this foundational task.

On November 14 we will consecrate our promises to support our church and join together in Memorial Hall for pie and mulled cider. What a wonderful way to cheerfully celebrate the cheerful giver! The members of Lady Elect will spend Saturday, November 13 in the church kitchen baking for this celebration.

November programming in our church includes many other important observances. We have all lost loved ones and the opportunity to remember those in worship on November 7 is very special. Plan to light a candle on Remembrance Sunday for loved ones you have lost, but hold close in your memories.

#### TREASURER'S REPORT

Below are the church operating results for the nine months ending September. Pledge income remains above budget. A large pledge payment was received in August 2020 that has not yet been received yet this year. The remainder of the CARES Act PPP funds was transferred from endowment to operations in September for a total of \$62,300 received in 2021. On the expense side, expenses are relatively flat compared to last year except for Human Resource Expenses. The increase in this area reflects that changes we have made in staffing. Overall expenses are under budget by \$4,097.

#### UPDATE FROM THE STRATEGIC PLANNING COMMITTEE

In November 2018, the Executive Ministry proposed the 2019 budget with the understanding that a Strategic Planning Committee (StratCom) would be formed. The following are the more significant activities that StratCom has been doing since it was formed:

#### In 2019, StratCom:

- Set their goal: Draft and implement a plan to restore the financial health of the church consistent with the church's mission.
- Met with the City of Webster Groves to learn about church zoning.
- Documented and inventoried church space for internal use, potential sale or lease.
- Hired a surveyor to determine legal boundary lines of the church property.

#### In 2020: StratCom:

- Recommended to Executive Ministry to contract with a real estate consultant as Project Manager (Zornesway).
- March, the real estate project was put on hold due to the pandemic.
- Performed Strengths, Weaknesses, Opportunities, Threats analysis to identify these items regarding the church.
- Zornesway showed the church spaces and met with several potential partners, including a space designer, construction company, caterer and senior living organization.

#### In 2021, StratCom:

- Received a below market bid from a real estate developer for the Gore parking lot.
- Researched alcohol being consumed in the church, finding alcohol can be served at the church. The church is covered under our current insurance policies if the event is church sponsored; however, the church cannot sell alcohol. If the event is not a church sponsored event (such as a wedding reception or trivia night), the church is not the responsible party. Rather the event holder is the responsible party and the church will request a certificate of insurance which shows the event holder has adequate insurance.
- Recommended to Executive Ministry to mutually terminate the agreement with Zornesway. Primarily due to the pandemic market environment, none of the many opportunities that were presented became viable options to move forward.
- Moved StratCom's focus pursuing renting church space. Consulted with NMBL Strategies, a marketing consulting firm that works in the not-for-profit area.
