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FROM THE PASTOR

New Year, New Definitions, Renewed Persistence

We respond to God's call by welcoming everyone regardless of ability, age, ethnicity, race, gender identity, sexual orientation or socioeconomic background. To proclaim in word and deed the love of Christ, we affirm that all may share in the full life, ministry, fellowship, responsibilities and blessing of our congregation. No matter who you are or where you are on life's journey, you are welcome here. (Our Open and Affirming Statement, 2008)

I've been reading *A Gospel for All Ages: Teaching and Preaching with the Whole Church*, by Prof. David Csinos of the Atlantic School of Theology, Halifax, Nova Scotia. Prof. Csinos asserts that the rise of capitalism and marketing in the 20th Century witnessed the creation of numerous new categories of people. Adolescent, toddler, tween, and emerging adult were added as target demographics to those of child, youth, young adult, adult, and senior.

Resulting from these narrower definitions has been churches divided by age into smaller and smaller subgroups. In some cases, we even lack common ground for understanding the world and ourselves in it. Senior adults now usually outnumber the younger folk; their preferences tend to govern policy, programming, and worship.

Congregations of longstanding are obligated, Csinos argues, to reset our frameworks, our paradigms, our mindsets, even just our goals. It will be a struggle, but we must become relevant to age groups only meagerly represented.

Reviewing our 2008 ONA Statement, it occurred to me that we also need to (re)commit ourselves to embracing and enfranchising LGBTQI+ people, as well as people of differing socio-economic classes, those with mental infirmities and illnesses, and people of color.

How do we provide an answer to all these voices and points of view?

We ask. We pay attention, not only when we hear words that affirm the direction in which we are currently going but also when they indicate new ways are needed. We must persist in faith, keep trying, adapt, and by doing so convince those who are not in our majority (as well as the majority) that it is worthwhile for them to be a part of *this!*

An old year is ending and a new one beginning. Let's be reminding ourselves of the commitments we've made as we acknowledge the challenges and promises ahead.

Have blessed holidays, but especially a joyous New Year!

This schedule is subject to change, as need may arise.

All worship services noted below will be offered in person and live streamed (bit.ly/FCCWG-YT), at the times indicated.

- Sunday, December 4, 10:00 am Second Sunday of Advent PEACE; Sacrament of Christ's Table. Scriptures: Isaiah 11:1-11; Psalm 72:1-7, 18-19; Romans 15:4-13; Matthew 3:1-12. Isaiah speaks of the Jesse Tree, Paul reminds Roman Christians of how they ought to behave, and John the Baptist preaches his version of a political sermon. All of them point toward a future when the world is a just and blessed place to be. Pastor Dave lays out the terms for peace in our time, or in any time. Message of the Day: "God Wants Peace"
- Sunday, December 11, 10:00 am Third Sunday of Advent JOY; **Hanging of the Greens.** This annual tradition at First Church includes our decoration of the sanctuary for Christmas. Everyone who comes gets to participate as we hear bells and carols again, and add wreaths, candles, a crèche, poinsettias, and the Christmas tree in a festive ritual of music and readings.
- Sunday, December 18, 10:00 am Fourth Sunday of Advent LOVE. <u>Scriptures</u>: Psalm 8:3-5; Luke 1:46-49. With the music of the Oîkos Jazz Ensemble featured, Pastoral Assistant Halley Kim shares a very special <u>Message of the Day</u>: "Our Not-So-Lowly State" (working title).

This afternoon at 3PM, please plan to attend "JAZZ NOEL – THE RETURN OF THE LIGHT."

- Saturday, December 24, 4:30 pm *Family Christmas Eve*. This brief worship service features many of the readings you'll have heard in the morning but with a Live Nativity tableau, including our newest addition as the Baby Jesus! "Gifts for the Manger" will be collected during the service infant and family needs to be presented to local charities, along with cash offerings. Singing of "Silent Night" ends the service, with battery-powered candles for the children to hold.
- Saturday, December 24, 9:00 pm *A Service of Nine Lessons and Carols*. This very special nighttime service incorporates voices and instruments performing readings and music that may be familiar or new, to celebrate of the birth of the Messiah and the mystery of the Incarnation. *This service will be followed with our Christmas Wassail Bowl reception*.

There will be <u>no services</u> conducted at First Church on Christmas Day, Sunday, December 25.

- Sunday, January 1, 2023, 10:00 am New Year's Day; Seventh Day of Kwanza'a Imani (Faith); Feast of the Holy Name of Jesus; All Ages Worship; Sacrament of Christ's Table; Holiday Hymn Sing. Scriptures: Ecclesiastes 3:1-13; Psalm 8; Revelation 21:1-6a; Matthew 25:31-46. This very special, all-ages worship service, conducted in Memorial Hall, includes a recognition of the communitarian values of the season of Kwanza'a and a Christmas/New Year Holiday Hymn Sing. (*Please note:* If you plan to attend on this Sunday, please be watching on December 4, 11, and 18 for a Narthex Table ballot of hymns from which to choose your favorites. Vote early and often; the most popular selections will be sung as our Message of the Day.)
- Sunday, January 8, 10:00 am Celebration of the Epiphany (observed). Scriptures: Isaiah 60:1-6; Psalm 67; 2 Timothy 1:5-10; Matthew 2:1-12. On this day we remember the arrival of the Magi in Bethlehem, the revelation of Good News to all the world, and the revolution introduced in the person of a toddler Messiah. Message of the Day: "How Creator Sets Free"
- Sunday, January 15, 10:00 am Second Sunday after the Epiphany; Sunday in MLK Holiday Weekend; Chancel Choir performs with the Oîkos Jazz Ensemble. Scriptures: Isaiah 9:2-7; Psalm 36:5-10; Romans 15:8-13; Matthew 4:12-17. Everywhere, today, our culture is beset by "Christian" voices who spout intolerance and who insist that persecution of defenseless people is God's will. What should our answer be? Message of the Day: "The Proper Role of a Christian"

Sunday, January 22, 10:00 am — Ecumenical Sunday (Week of Prayer for Christian Unity). The World Council of Churches and the Pontifical Council for Promoting Christian Unity Joint Commission on the Week of Prayer for Christian Unity has named the theme for the 2023 Week's observance: "Do Good; Seek Justice" (Scripture: Isaiah 1:12-18). First Church's commitment to social justice traces back to our founding in 1866. In the 1950s Pastor Ervine Inglis, served as president of the Metropolitan Church Federation, a St. Louis area ecumenical group. MCF ceased operation in 1978, replaced in large part by the local chapter of the National Coalition of Christians and Jews (and led by Rev. O'Ray Graber who would become an Associate Pastor here). In 1991, four regional groups united to form the multi-faith Metropolitan Congregations United (MCU) which now carries forward the work MCF and NCCJ began.

On this Ecumenical Sunday, we pray for unity of purpose and message with our fellow Christians in proclaiming Good News, a message echoed in the calls for justice and righteousness from other Abrahamic traditions. Post-worship, join representatives from MCU for an Adult Education presentation about MCU's current initiatives.

Sunday, January 29, 10:00 am — Heritage Sunday (157TH Anniversary); Health and Human Service Sunday (UCC).

Scriptures: Micah 6:6-8; Psalm 15; 1 Corinthians 1:18-25; Matthew 5:1-12. On a day when we may be tempted into nostalgia, Pastor Dave Denoon considers some of the words that are most central to our understandings about faith. We have to know where we've been in order to have a strong sense of where we are and where we have the potential to go. Message of the Day: "Balancing Act"

Worship will be followed by our annual Midwinter Potluck. Watch the eNews and bulletin for more information.

The December offering in First Congregational Church of Webster Groves Concert Series is "Hymns and Hollers Live: A Winter Solstice Concert" featuring Walter Parks who lives in Webster and is an acclaimed roots musician. Judy Collins has said: "Walter Parks is an extraordinary singer whose songs can break your heart as well as get you dancing. Lyrical and political, personal and otherworldly at the same time, transcendent as well as down to earth, Walter is a musical treasure, an artist of the highest caliber. To hear him is to be lifted into

a mystical sphere. I adore him." The concert will take place in the church's Memorial Hall on December 10 at 7pm. This concert is free and open to the public. In August 2020 Walter Parks was invited by The Library of Congress to archive his research on and perform his arrangements of music made by southeast Georgia's Okefinokee Swamp homesteaders — hollers, hymns and reels. For 10 years Parks, a Florida native, served as the sideman guitarist to Woodstock Festival legend Richie Havens. Walter has recently co-written with Stan Lynch, former Tom Petty drummer and has performed at various venues with R&B drum legend Bernard Purdie and at Lincoln Center with Judy Collins. Walter tours with his own trio Swamp Cabbage, with his solo show Swamp By Chandelier and with an Americana spirituals project called The Unlawful Assembly co-founded by drummer Steven Williams. Walter was a member of The Nudes, a popular folk duo, with cellist Stephanie Winters.

Items to note include:

- The Decrease in Net Assets this year is \$52,142 greater than last year's Decrease in Net Assets at this time last year.
- Total Revenue is down \$19,809 this is due to several factors:
 - ♦ Last year, the church had recorded \$62,300 in PPP loan receipts
 - Pledge revenue is lower \$17,312
 - ♦ To offset these decreases:
 - The church has received \$35,000 more from the Endowment this year
 - Use of space income is up \$19,316 compared to last year of which \$7,536 is due to 10 West Lockwood events.
- Expenses are \$32,333 higher this year. The increase in expenses is primarily due to:
 - \$21k: Higher staff expenses, including the new audio visual position (\$8.6k)
 - \$9.6k: Higher F&F expenses, including higher insurance (\$8.7k) and utilities expense (\$9.1k) which are offset by lower office expenses (-\$2.7k) and building maintenance expense (-\$5.5k)
- The cash position of the church is flat. The church currently has 2 months of operating funds on hand. It is recommended to have 3 to 6 months of cash reserves on hand.

Update from Ghanaian military chaplain Rev. Gershon Dotse

Last spring, our friend Gershon Dotse told us about his military unit's work as part of an African Union peacekeeping force in South Sudan. Part of peacekeeping is economic development, and Rev. Dotse's unit led with instruction in the trade of tailoring. Our monetary gifts were combined with those from other donors, so that the local citizens they trained might be given new sewing machines to work with. On September 30, Rev. Dotse reported,

I hope you are doing great by grace. By God's grace and your kind donation, our tailoring course had a great graduation. May God continue to bless you. [Here] are some pictures. Thank you. We bought a total of 13 sewing machines, one each for the participants and three for the training center to increase enrollment next time.

UPDATE ON ROOM AT THE INN

In my last article, I mentioned that Room at the Inn transformed into a 24/7 facility at their Bridgeton location at the beginning of the pandemic. The update is that the city of Bridgeton has approved RATI's permanent status to provide living space 24/7. This is very good news because it dramatically reduces the stress on clients who had to move to a different location every night. The next step is for the building in Bridgeton to be adapted, to house about 20 clients at a time until they get permanent housing.

In the meantime, our church provides financial support funded through the Benevolence Fund. This helps pay for food, clothing, transportation, and staff. During the Holiday Season, we have historically provided gift cards to the clients on Room at the Inn. I would like to make that effort easy to continue by offering to collect donations in cash throughout the Holiday Season. I will convert these donations into gift cards in the right denominations for the stores that these clients can access easily.

THE CHRISTMAS FUND

For the Veterans of the Cross and the Emergency Fund

The Christmas Fund has been caring for active and retired clergy and lay employees of the United Church of Christ for over 100 years, providing emergency grants, supplementation of small annuities and health premiums, and Christmas "Thank You" gift checks each December to our lower-income retirees. Over the past 18 months, the emergency financial needs of many who serve the church increased dramatically. Many of our clergy continue to bear the consequences of lost or decreased income. These difficult times make the need for the Christmas Fund more urgent than ever.



BENEVOLENCE MISSION PARTNER:WEBSTER – ROCK HILL MINISTRIES



Webster-Rock Hill Ministries is one of many agencies supported by benevolence funds from our church. This non-profit was founded in 1982 by churches in the area and we were one of those original founders. It had been recognized that people of all ages who were in need would benefit from a community agency rather than going from church to church for assistance. Webster-Rock Hill Ministries (WRHM) offers help to people in the 63119 zipcode as well as members of local churches no matter where they live. Services available include food pantry and toiletry bags, utility assistance, home repairs, nurse and legal consultations, holiday programs, and a community garden. A tutoring program


in cooperation with the Webster Groves School District is being explored at this time as well as a summer camp. Those two programs had to be discontinued during the pandemic.

One Saturday each month a food bag drive through is available to anyone who needs it no matter where they live. Marilyn Claggett and Rosemary Hensley are our current representatives on the WRHM Board of Directors. Jane Porchey and Linda Waltz work in the food pantry weekly.
