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FROM THE PASTOR

Naming and Glorifying

"Now my soul is troubled. And what should I say — 'Father/Mother, save me from this hour'?

No, it is for this reason that I have come to this hour. Mother/Father, glorify your name."

(John 12:27-28, NRSV)

In the gospel according to John, Jesus says the words above, only a few paragraphs after riding into Jerusalem on the back of a donkey. Through most of the season of Easter, this year, I am committed to sharing messages with you that focus on the concepts of identity and naming, and of acting or praying in someone's name. The last of these messages will come on Pentecost Sunday, May 28, when I will invite us to be wondering together what it means to be an *ekklesia* (Greek for, "those who are called out") in God's name, in Jesus' name, and as people of a Holy Spirit. How shall we assume and adopt such an identity for ourselves?

I'm planting a bit of a seed now, as we are approaching Easter, in the interest of that message, come Pentecost.

As I write this, there are movements across the country to stifle the voices and sully the reputations of LGBTQ+ people, literally to *unname them*, in the belief that doing so will be to protect young children. Men in drag shouldn't read to little ones from storybooks, they argue. Others are persisting that no one ought to be talking about their sexuality in a classroom setting. Gender-affirming care, these folk assert, is child abuse, and gender-affirming surgery for children must be outlawed (even though there is no such practice). I have watched with pride and admiration as one colleague of mine and her transgender son, age 10, have appeared on national and local news and in the halls of power in Jefferson City, testifying to the importance of affirming *who her son is*, wherever he may be.

We already exist in a culture which systemically discriminates against Black and brown people, women, and people with disabilities, using all kinds of prejudices and other assumptions about the differences between people as its excuses. There is no need for more such measures, when we are desperately trying to emerge from an already-discriminatory past.

If our acceptance of the label "Open and Affirming" is anything more than a label, then it would appear that we have some work to do, to prevent the damage that is being done by some in God's name and by even more in the name of little children. It is indeed "for this reason that [we] have come to this hour."

This Resurrection season, may we be glorifying God's name in our advocacy and action, as those of a Holy Spirit gathered in Christ's name.

WORSHIP NOTES FOR APRIL & MAY 2023

This schedule is subject to change, as need may arise.

All worship services noted below will be offered in person and live streamed (bit.ly/FCCWG-YT), at 10:00 am on Sundays.

- April 2 Palm Sunday of the Passion of Christ; Sacrament of Christ's Table; All Ages Worship. Scriptures: Matthew 21:1-11; 26:36-46. Once the palms have been blessed and communion served, using our imaginations we will go to Gethsemane and recollect in story and song the things that happened there. As Jesus prayed in that garden, "Take this cup away," we reflect on times we may have wished we would not have to face. Theme of the Day: "Risking Temptation"
- Thursday, April 6, 7:00 pm First Congregational worshipers are invited to join Sts. Clare & Francis Ecumenical Catholic Communion in the William E. Sample Chapel for a service remembering the night of the Last Supper. (not live-streamed)
- FRIDAY, APRIL 7, 7:00 PM Good Friday Blues: "What We Risk." Three women who have been traveling with Jesus on his final pilgrimage to Jerusalem reflect together about what they've left behind and what lies ahead. The narrative leans heavily on the discussions we have been having about Amy-Jill Levine's book, Entering the Passion of Jesus: A Beginner's Guide to Holy Week. The women's conversation is punctuated with music of Billie Holiday, John Coltrane, Jon Batiste, Sting, and more all according to the stylings of the Oîkos Jazz Ensemble.
- **APRIL 9** Easter: Celebration of the Resurrection. "Christ is risen! Alleluia!" we shout for joy, upon the discovery of his empty tomb. Our series of messages, based closely on the scholarship of Prof. Amy-Jill Levine, concludes with "The Next Supper (or Breakfast)" as the pastor focuses on where to expect Jesus will be showing up.
- **APRIL 16** Second Sunday of Easter. Guest preacher Rev. Jan Barnes brings the Message of the Day while the pastor enjoys some vacation.
- **APRIL 23** Third Sunday of Easter. Student Minister Gabriel Requadt partners with Pastor Dave Denoon for a dialogue Message of the Day, largely reflective of Gabriel's experiences both in Contextual Education and in seminary generally.
- **April 30** Fourth Sunday of Easter; "Break the Silence" Sunday (observed); Pacific Islander and Asian-American Ministries (PAAM) Sunday. Pastor Dave Denoon begins a new series of Messages "In the Name of..." In an era truly, an era! of reflection on personal and collective identities, it is time for us to consider the importance of the names we bear and the names we assume and how these names affect our senses of self and group. On this "Break the Silence" Sunday in the United Church of Christ, an occasion for recognizing the importance of ending sexualized violence in our society and affirming its victims, the pastor zeroes in on the mystery and sanctity of self with a reflection on the name of God, "I Am." Scripture: Exodus 3:13-16; Mark 14:53-64a.
- May 7 Fifth Sunday of Easter; Sacrament of Christ's Table; All Ages Worship (in Memorial Hall). "In the Name of..." continues with some thoughts about Jesus' practice of renaming his disciples, and what it might mean for us to invite Jesus to guide us into new understandings of ourselves. Message of the Day: "Change My Name." Scriptures: Genesis 32:23-30; Matthew 16:13-20.
- May 14 Sixth Sunday of Easter; Mothers Day. Message of the Day: "True to Yourself." On this day which also is called, the Festival of the Christian Home, we may be brought to mind of the importance of the names of all those who have made our own identity possible, by bloodline or adoption. When parents tell children going out on their own to "remember who you are," what sort of expectations are they setting? Scriptures: Ruth 1:1-20; 2 Timothy 1:5-7.
- May 21 Seventh Sunday of Easter; Mental Health Sunday. What are we hoping for when we pray "in Jesus' name" or in "the name of the [Holy Trinity]"? There can be power associated with naming, especially when we are identifying with the One whose name(s) we invoke in prayer. With warnings in mind about the use of God's name "in vain," we approach the Message of the Day: "A Hundred Names." Scriptures: Exodus 20:1-8; Acts 3:1-10; John 12:23-28.
- May 28 Pentecost; Sunday of Memorial Day weekend. As the seasonal series of messages concludes, we focus on how we might identify ourselves as the Church. Who are we hoping to be? What are we intending to do? How can we gauge whether or not we are realizing success in God's name? Message of the Day: "In the Name of..." Scriptures: Acts 2:1-20; 4:32-35.

After months of work by members and ministries of the church, the *Giant Church Clean-Out Sale* will happen April 14 and 15. Workers are needed both before and during the event. Spread the word. We have a huge quantity of interesting things that need to be re-purposed. In the process we have cleaned out a number of spaces that will be excellent office spaces. These will be available for lease in the near future. Please mention this to individuals and groups looking for space. They would benefit from reasonable rent in an excellent location. We would benefit by increasing our monthly income. A win-win.

The Nominating Committee is diligently working to fill the open slots for church officers and ministries. Their deadline is April 17 when the Executive Ministry meets to confirm the slate. The ministry will then call the required Congregational Meeting to hold the election. We anticipate that meeting to be Sunday, May 7. In May we will transition to new leadership. Our ministry structure fosters both continuity and change. In the teaching and learning of history we are challenged to comprehend the interplay of change and continuity while avoiding the assumption that either is more natural or more to be expected. STRATEGIC PLANNING COMMITTEE REPORT

To meet the many challenges being faced by First Congregational Church of Webster Groves, in 2018 the Strategic Planning Committee was formed.

The goal of the Strategic Planning Committee is to draft and implement a plan to restore the financial health of the church consistent with the church's mission. Increasing financial needs and diminishing revenue have resulted in an increased dependence on the use of the invested portion of the Endowment Fund to meet the obligations of the budget. In June 2021, the Strategic Planning Committee agreed to focus on marketing church spaces for events, creating 10 West Lockwood Event Space (currently defined as Memorial Hall, the kitchen, Inglis Room and Kishlar Room).



In 2022, the Committee consulted with NMBL Strategies, a marketing firm that frequently works with not-for-profit groups. Through November 2022, NMBL Strategies helped the Committee get 10 West Lockwood Event Space off the ground. In 2022, the church received nearly \$19,000 of revenue for events in those rooms.

In December 2022, as approved in the budget, the Committee started looking to replace the consulting firm with a part-time event

coordinator. With ten viable candidates, the Committee hired Alicia McMinn in January 2023. Alicia has taken on the role with great enthusiasm and energy. By the end of February 2023, 10 West Lockwood Event Space had received \$3,300 from individuals and organizations having their events here.

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FROM HALLEY, THE PASTORAL ASSISTANT

I have some big news: I have been accepted into the Brown School's Master of Social Work program at Washington University! I will begin my coursework in August. I intend to pursue macro social work, more specifically in the policy arena. I am thrilled to begin a new chapter of my life ("17th Grade," as I explained it to my children) and pursue a large-scale expression of loving my neighbors as Jesus commanded us to do.

Because I will be going to school full time, and because I also have three young children and would like to sleep here and there, I am resigning from my position as Pastoral Assistant here at FCCWG. I will remain in my role through most of July; my last Sunday will be July 23rd, and my last workday will be July 27th.

It has been a gift to serve you all, the last two years. It's hard for me to put into words how powerful it's been for me to have been entrusted with significant church leadership, particularly the privilege of the pulpit. I long-ago put aside the misogynistic doctrine that women cannot lead and preach, but the corrective experiences of actually doing those things was profound. I'll never forget tearing up at the end of my first sermon about how my daughters, unlike me, will never think gender has anything to do with leadership potential. You invited me not only into a job, but an opportunity for personal healing – thank you.

Thank you, also, for entrusting me with your children. It has been a delight to get to know them, to laugh with them, to support them through challenges, and to watch them grow. I remember with fondness the Sunday that I had an animated conversation about the with the Byrne sisters and one of their friends; what an honor it was to hold space for their frustrations and questions. Of course, every Sunday I look forward to the commentary "from the mouths of babes" during Not for Children Only – it never disappoints.

I'm so grateful for Carina and Noel and what they bring to Kids Church, each and every week. It has been a joy to work with them, and I breathe easier knowing their capable care will continue here at First Church. Thank you to my volunteers who serve again and again and again. Thank you for your openness to new things, to shift from the educational focus of Sunday School towards the spiritual formation focus of Kids Church. (Thank you for your good-natured spirits with the growing pains!)

It has been a joy to be part of the staff here at FCCWG. I have learned from and been changed for the better by Dave, Debbie, Cliff, Leon, Chip, Darrell, Mark, Alicia, and three seminary students: Merrimon, Elston, and Gabriel. I will miss staff meeting silliness and birthday celebrations with this crew! Dave has been a wonderful mentor and boss. I'm so glad he took a chance on me, an outsider, to exercise my gifts in this small but mighty church.

Rest assured that the Christian Education and Executive Ministries are getting to work quickly to hire a new Pastoral Assistant. The hope is that my replacement will start work here in mid-July so that I may provide two weeks of training. I am confident the church will weather this transition well, and that the new Pastoral Assistant will be a blessing to FCCWG.

First, I am offering to all the Schubert C Major Quintet with Anna Lackshewitz on April 16 at 3:00 pm.
