

The cross image gracing the sanctuary vault is a depiction of the three basic strokes in Japanese *sumi-e* painting, representing reality (vertical), time (horizontal), and movement (circle). They closely resemble the Celtic cross in which the lines and circle are associated with heaven (vertical), earth (horizontal), and eternity (circle). *Sumi-e* painter Chiura Obata was a member of First Church, from 1943 to 1945, and planners of our Jubilee in 2016 commissioned this work as an expression of our commitment to justice and freedom. It was crafted by Kem Williams and made possible by a grant from the Dr. Rodney M. Coe Memorial Fund.

Lent Devotional Study – "This Is My Body" After Worship (about 11:30am) during Lent and in Kids Church

The Pastor and the Coordinator of Faith Formation announce a devotional study for all ages during Lent, starting Sunday, February 18 and continuing through Palm Sunday, March 24. The devotional booklets, *This Is My Body* by Illustrated Ministry, are designed for home use (one for adults and the other for families) and group discussion. Participants will explore how Jesus lived in his body on earth and invite us to take care of – and embrace the goodness of – our own bodies.

Each week highlights a different story from Jesus' life and connects it to shared human experiences – like growing up, taking naps, or even drinking water. By engaging with these stories through a broad lens of embodiment, *This Is My Body* seeks to inspire curiosity, wonder, and awe. Adult discussions will take place on Sundays during Coffee Fellowship; young people will talk about *This Is My Body* in Kids Church.



Moderator's Corner, February 2024

When I write a Moderator's Corner, I have a secret fear of misinterpreting something I share from the Bible. With current and retired ministers and devoted Christians in our midst, I squint and hold my breath like an archer drawing their bow as I click *Send*, delivering my work to Debbie Tolstoi. I fear recoil, or worse, a volley of arrows in return following its publishing. With that said, the topic for today begins in Leviticus 25 (New International Version):

25 The LORD said to Moses at Mount Sinai, ² "Speak to the Israelites and say to them: 'When you enter the land I am going to give you, the land itself must observe a sabbath to the LORD. ³ For six years sow your fields, and for six years prune your vineyards and gather their crops. ⁴ But in the seventh year the land is to have a year of sabbath rest, a sabbath to the LORD. Do not sow your fields or prune your vineyards."

According to my research, this is an early reference to a Sabbatical (Shmita) Year, the seventh year, when the land is left fallow so it can rest and rejuvenate. The work done in agrarian society is forbidden. In preparation for Shmita, families would budget food and resources in the years preceding. The people may use the food that grows on their land during the Sabbatical Year to provide for those that rely on them. This is a time that requires caring for your community in ways that might not be as necessary during a typical year.

Pastor Dave begins his own sabbatical this June, which will run through the summer. This will be his final sabbatical as Pastor of our congregation, as he plans to retire in five years. To prepare for this sabbatical season, we have budgeted money to afford a Sabbatical Minister, formed a Sabbatical Committee to make preparations, and we are blessed with the support and guidance from Rev. Damien Lake of the Missouri Mid-South Conference.

Rev. Lake provided a book suggestion for the committee that I now want to pass on to you, *Planning Sabbaticals: A Guide for Congregations and their Pastors* by Robert C. Saler. This is a very short read and is available online through the St. Louis County Library system for free as an ebook using the digital app, *Hoopla*. Your local librarian can help you get connected.

My past experience of a sabbatical was the one we all experienced seven years ago. During that sabbatical period, the journey of immersion, study and restoration that Pastor Dave was living in Africa was closely related to the work our congregation was doing with our Sabbatical Pastor, Sonya Vann.

Reading Saler's book, two key points helped me think differently about sabbaticals. First, what a pastor does with their time on sabbatical is for *their own* renewal, not ours. Sabbatical experiences vary greatly in nature. This is a time for Pastor Dave to reconnect with himself.

Second, the congregation's sabbatical time is determined by the congregation and should support their own renewal. Our renewal period may be unrelated to what Pastor Dave is doing and that is ok. According to Saler, our congregation's sabbatical time will have been successful if our activities are "encouraging leadership among congregation members while also creating space for reflection."

I want to encourage you to think and talk with members about what you would like this sabbatical time to be for us and for you. When the sabbatical period has ended, I hope we can come together re-energized, rejuvenated, and ready to do the Lord's work.
