Jazz Belongs in Church — Part I

For the past eight years I have been a contributing writer for *Worship Music & Ministry* a journal produced by the UCC Musicians Association. My three times a year column is about jazz and the church, providing a context for jazz in worship while offering ideas and resources for church music ministries wishing to include jazz in their liturgical life.

This article was published several years ago. I thought you might like insight into my jazz ministry at our church. The following is part one of that extended essay.

One Church's Response to Jazz in Worship

It was 1971. I was home from college on break and chatting with my pastor about my first semester attending a church-related college. Pastor Bert, my spiritual mentor, had been instrumental in helping me realize that God just might be nudging me to a "call to ministry." It was an exciting time in my young life.

After a long conversation he agreed to let me lead a jazz quartet in Sunday morning worship—at both services. Our church dated back to 1812 and was a unique blend of old-time traditionalists and younger families committed to progressive outreach in the community. It was a busy and vital congregation. The high school youth group numbered 40 to 60 on any given Sunday. It was also the time of Viet Nam, social unrest, riots in the street, and hippies espousing sex, drugs and rock 'n' roll. And so, yes, my hair was on the long side.

Sunday morning came and the band started the prelude: Miles Davis' "All Blues." After only a few brief moments the first person stood up to leave, followed by another and yet another. In all, at least thirty people walked out of the first service. The second, larger-attended service had just as many, if not more, follow suit. The fallout in the congregation was cataclysmic, and the repercussions lasted for weeks (long after I had returned to college).

Pastor Bert, and his staff, came under fire by those who felt these "hippies" had played "the devil's music" in church. How could he allow such un-Christian music in the sanctuary to defile worship? Two days after the "devil's music service" I was invited to attend the Tuesday morning meeting of staff and I feared I would be on the hot seat. But Pastor Bert, to his credit and my relief, justified using jazz as an appropriate way to worship God. Even though he was not a jazz fan he admitted the music was performed joyfully, and didn't the Psalmist say that we're supposed to "make a joyful noise unto the Lord," (Psalm 100:1). It wasn't just noise, like so many complained, it was "joyful noise" in the form of a music called jazz. Even though the

pastoral staff affirmed the playing of jazz in the worship service, it took a lot of pastoral care and leadership to weather the "crisis."

In the weeks following, Pastor Bert held his ground, explaining to the congregation the need for experiencing new forms of worship, even jazz. The key to it all, he said again and again, was the spiritual intent of worship. If it was based in praise to God and love for each other, surely God smiled upon us. The furor did not die down immediately but the edginess was reduced and I was still welcomed by the members of the church even though many disagreed with my music. Christian love prevailed.

Fast forward to 2008. Thirty-seven years later I was invited back to my old church by Pastor Tom, a huge jazz fan. The congregation's response this time? Smiles, hand clapping, swaying bodies and, at the conclusion, a standing ovation and countless accolades. Pastor Bert, long since retired, was seated in the congregation and gave me a big hug afterward. Both he and I knew that the wheels of the Church turn slowly.

So what changed? Had my saxophone playing gotten that much better, or had enough time passed for the congregation to become culturally "hip"? Perhaps a little of both, but the truth is far deeper. In part two I will share a brief history of jazz, its place in worship, and the birth of the Oikos Ensemble and our creative music ministry.
